RESTORATION OF PRE-COVID LITURGICAL PRACTICES

The Bishop has announced that in the Motherwell Diocese all Pre-Covid Liturgical practices should now be restored. This includes the hand-shake as an appropriate sign of peace, the reception of Holy Communion on the tongue, and the opportunity for the lay faithful to receive the Precious Blood from the Chalice, where this custom previously existed or is now deemed desirable.

I understand that the reception of the Precious Blood of the lay faithful was a custom in St Mark's but not in St Anthony's? If you are interested in reintroducing this practice in our Churches then please let me know. The Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion will of course need to agree to the resumption of this practice. If the response is overwhelmingly positive, we can begin to reintroduce this practice in the next few weeks.

SATURDAY 17TH JUNE

Matthew, having taken us through the Sermon on the Mount, returns once more to Jesus teaching disciples. It is interesting that Jesus does this for the benefit of the crowds of people gathering round Jesus, who likens them to sheep who lack a shepherd. Jesus is the ultimate shepherd figure, but even he cannot shepherd all the sheep on his own, so he sets the twelve disciples to share in that work. For Matthew, no one—not even Jesus—can shepherd on his own.

WEDNESDAY 21ST JUNE

THE MEMORIAL OF ST ALOYSIUS GONZAGA

St Aloysius Gonzaga (1568-91) was born of a noble family in Lombardy, the oldest of seven children. Still a child, his father gave him military training. However, at 17 years of age he won a four-year long battle with his father to give up his inheritance to become a Jesuit. When a plague broke out in Rome in 1591, the Jesuits opened a hospital to care for the sick. Aloysius, who had never enjoyed good health, was infected and died, aged 23. he is one of the patrons of young people.

Each year on this day, our Churches in Scotland, England and Wales and Ireland celebrate the Day for Life, a day in our Church's year which is dedicated to raising awareness about the meaning and value of human life at every stage and in every condition from the womb to the tomb.

This year's theme, Listen to Her, tells Jane's Story of the healing a woman found through the Church and the Sacraments and a Rachel's Vineyard retreat following the tragic circumstances of her abortion, and of her long journey back to peace and light. At the end of her journey, she found the consolation and joy of accepting herself and her motherhood in the grace of GOD. This year's theme focuses on the all too often silent voices of women like Jane, on their regret, their lifelong struggle with post-abortion trauma and their hope of eventual healing and new life. ONGOING FORMATION

In our Ongoing Formation group we have continued to follow the course 'Introduction to the Bible' by Dr Brant Petrie. We listen to recordings of his lectures and then discuss various points raised. We recently discuss the work of Pope Benedict XV. In his encyclical *Spiritus Paraclitus* (1920) he points out that St. Jerome never questions the fact that the individual authors of the books of the Bible worked in full freedom under the divine afflatus, each of them in accordance with his individual nature and character... In each case Jerome shows us how, in composition, in language, in style and mode of expression, each of them uses his own gifts and powers... If we ask how we are to explain the power and action of God, the principal cause, on the sacred writers, we shall find that St. Jerome in no wise differs from the common teaching of the Catholic Church. For he holds that God, through his grace, illumines the writers mind regarding the particular truth that, "in the person of God," he is to set before men. He holds, moreover, that God moves the writer's will—nay, even impels it—to write; finally, that God abides with him unceasingly, in unique fashion, until his task is accomplished. (Benedict XV, Spiritus Paraclitus 3).

Pope Benedict also outlines St Jerome's recommended reading order of the Bible. Begin with the Psalms, then read Solomon's Proverbs to learn a way of life, then learn from Ecclesiastes how to trample the world. Then in Job find an example of patient virtue. Then pass to the Gospels, the Acts and the Epistles. Then read the Prophets, then Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy, Joshua and Judges. Then Kings, and Chronicles, Ezra and Esther, then Solomon's Canticle of Canticles (Benedict XV, Spiritus Paraclitus 516).
